## July Program by Kelly Griffin Gasterias, Haworthias and Aloes...and oh so much more...

An Adventure to the Eastern Cape, Western Cape, Northern Cape of South Africa, and even a glimpse into Namibia!

This will not be a typical travel log as this was not a typical South African tour. The plan was to go to places that are not the usual "go to" places.



I traveled to South Africa on a choreographed expedition specifically to see many special succulent plants. The big bucket list objective for me was to study Aloes, specifically Aloe glauca complex in habitat and to see them in flower. Success all around and so much more! I spent over three weeks seeing Gasterias, Haworthias and Aloes in the Cape and even ventured into the little Karoo as well. We managed to see a newly described gasteria, Gasteria barbae along with another brand new one that has yet to be described. I saw Haworthias badia, bobeii and minima among many others. This program has perhaps too many new plants! Forget that, you can't have too many plants! Can you?

Such interesting places, so many fantastic plants.....just an incredible experience to share.

I am currently working as a Plant Development Manager for Altman Plants headquartered in Vista, Ca. I have been working on creating new cultivars and introducing succulent plants for some 20 years, the last I2 professionally. Some introductions include Aloes Delta lights, Delta Dawn, Christmas Sleigh, Pink Blush, Pink Thing, Christmas Carol, Viper, Sunrise with new ones coming soon. Agave cultivars ~ blue glow, black and blue, snow glow, cubic, creme brulee and moto sierra with more on the way. Additionally, I have helped to introduce a number of fine species that were not so much in cultivation including Agave albopilosa, Aloe castilloniae and Echeveria cante to list just a few

Chuck bought his Normal Heights home in 1995, and the property has gone through much transformation. The front yard is full sun desert landscaping with cactus and summer dormant succulents. We do not have a greenhouse but the back yard is shaded with a large bay laurel tree which chuck planted shortly after moving in. We have several shelving fixtures full of container plants in the back yard. Chuck planted three different kinds of bamboo along the south property line for more shade and to act as a barrier from the apartment building next door. Jim moved in with Chuck in December, 2011, bringing along 250 containers of plants. We have a great assortment of cactus, succulents, tillandsias, and carnivorous plants and hope you enjoy a stroll through our yard.

Please be advised that our property is small with narrow uneven walkways and gravel paths. Our home may be difficult for those with limited mobility. We will have many plants for sale, mostly smaller rooted cuttings along with some tillandsias and larger plants. There will also be a freebie section with plants and bamboo stakes.



Please bring a box in which to carry your purchases and cash, as we won't have access to credit/debit sales.



The easiest way to find us is from the I-15 and Adams Ave. Travel west on Adams Ave from I-15 to the next traffic signal which is Cherokee Avenue. Vons is on that corner. Turn south (left) and we are 2 ½ blocks on the right side of the street. FYI...Jim will bake

for this event so there will be snacks and drinks available.



#### Additions to our Library By Don Hunt

One of the things that make our June sale so great is having Chuck Everson bring his specialty books. So naturally, we added a few to our library. First, there's a book about the Coronado Islands. According to Chuck, it was published by Chevron Oil, of all people and never offered for sale. It's interesting, because the islands are so close to San Diego, but of course, they are owned and administered by Mex-



ico, so that is the perspective of the book. While the book is comprehensive in overview, I feel it was published to curry political favor. Very little on the botanical side, it may not belong in our library. I'd like other opinions on this one.



Next up, *The Genus Ceropegia*, by Dennis de Kock. I was eagerly waiting for this one, as ceropegias are interesting, but not much information is published about them. It still isn't. The not very large book is primarily pictures of the flowers. Ceropegia flowers are pretty unique and distinctive. I don't know who this book is intended for. I find it odd.

Moving into something more useful, we have *Small Opuntias* by John Pilbeam and Michael Partridge. At this point, I'd buy about anything Pilbeam puts out, and he didn't disappoint me with this. What is really covered well in this book are the tephrocactus and other South American opuntias, some of which we don't see a lot of. Lots of opportunity for best opuntia in show here. The usual excellent Pilbeam effort here, great pictures, interesting detail, cultivation notes and maps. I like maps.






If Pilbeam is a must buy, then so is the author of our next book by Gordon Rowley. Succulents in cultivation—breeding new cultivars. Information into what Kelly does. He does get a credit on the aloe page, if not the agaves. Lots of different plants are covered, odd cactus as well as commonly hybridized plants like epicactus and haworthias. I predict this will be a very popular book. Lots of data on the why and how of

breeding plants. If you are able to check it out, be sure to return it promptly.

Last book, The Genus Commiphora by Jason Eslamieh. We already have this authors Bursera and Boswellia titles. If you are considering adding any of these to your plant collections, you would be well advised to check out these books for his considerable knowledge. Fore warned is fore armed. They are very well done and cover most if not all commiphora.





#### Plant of the Month: The Ruth Bancroft Garden by Kirsten Higgens, SDCSS Webmaster

Almost a year ago, while perusing the gardening section at Barnes and Noble, I came across "The Bold Dry Garden – Lessons from the Ruth Bancroft Garden" by Johanna Silver. I read the first couple of pages, and flipped through the rest of the book. It took me all of 45 seconds to realize I needed this book – as it would clearly provide a plethora of inspiration for my own amateur gardening endeavors.

Then a few months back, I received a wedding invitation for my cousin's wedding in San Martin, California. This wedding was to take place on June 2nd. After much lamentation that this once in a lifetime event (I presume) just happened to coincide with the most anticipated succulent event of the year, the SDCSS Annual Summer Show & Sale, I realized it provided an opportunity to visit the Ruth Bancroft Garden. Behold! — a silver lining.





So on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, my cousin Melissa and I made the trip to Walnut Creek. As we wandered around the 3 acres that comprise the garden, passages from "The Bold Dry Garden" would come floating back to me. While it is entirely possible to enjoy the garden without knowing the history, it's impossible to fully appreciate it. At the age of 63, when most are considering retirement, Ruth began to cultivate and construct her garden, completely unaware that it would become her living legacy. She was truly a pioneer for the waterwise / dry garden movement.

In my talk this month, I'll be sharing a photo essay, along with some history and anecdotes about Ruth and her marvelous garden. Here's a little preview:

In the 1970's, Ruth planted this trio of desert fan palms (Washington filifera) from one-gallon containers.

Brian Kemble: "You were planting the garden when you were in your sixties, and people said, 'It takes so long for these things to get big, you'll never live to see it.'

Ruth: "Well, who cares if I'm around or not? Someone will be around. And if I don't plant it then nobody will get to see it."

Brian: "But you did, and there they are. And they became magnificent."
